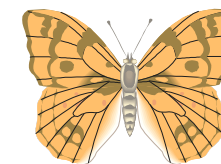
By this God is glorified, that you bear much fruit, and so prove to be my disciples. John 15:8

When school is in session, there is a church service on Sunday mornings for the boarding students. About once a month or so students lead the service, and this month our Scripture Union group led the order of worship and hymn-singing, offered prayers, read the scripture, received the offering, and shared a message during the sermon time.

The scripture the students chose was the story of the birth of Jesus in Matthew 1:18-25. Mphonyana and Bokang both spoke on these verses. Their names are quite appropriate for the text as they mean “Small Gift” and “Praise! Give thanks!” respectively. As God was with both Joseph and Mary during their difficult time, so God is with us even today in the problems we face. Mphonyana, in particular, could testify to this as she was hospitalized after falling and suffering burns from hot water she was carrying. She has made a full recovery and although small in stature, she has a big heart for Jesus!

Later that afternoon our SU meeting was blessed by the presence of Mr. Waza. Ntate Waza is the high school coordinator for Scripture Union in Lesotho and he was spending a week visiting schools in the southern part of the country. He organized and led the SU Camp in December and is greatly loved by the SU kids. The group members were delighted to see him again and he will be leading a training session here for student leaders at the end of the month. He has borne much fruit through his labors in reaching out to the young people of Lesotho.

Jesus says in the remaining words of John 15:8 that by bearing fruit you will be “showing yourselves to be my disciples.” While telling others we are disciples is well and good, I’m always mindful of that old adage, “Actions speak louder than words.” Even better, we could remember that old grade school tradition of “Show and Tell”! ~Mark Behle, a missionary with the Lesotho Evangelical Church

Book Study for the Entire Congregation

On August 15th our entire congregation is invited to join together for a book study on Five Practices of Fruitful Congregations – Cultivating Fruitfulness through Prayer and Practice by Robert Schnase. This is a great opportunity for our congregation to grow together and be united in one common goal. Each family will receive a book that they may share; we are encouraging our youth and kids to read and participate in this study as well. The books will be available for pick up on Sunday, August 7th and 14th. Each week we will examine and consider a different topic with a short daily reading. At the end of the week the sermon will focus on that particular topic.

Please note that Pastor Tim and his family will also be reading this book while they are on Sabbatical. Pastor Linda will preach on the first three topics, and Pastor Tim will preach on the last two topics.

So what are the topics? Radical Hospitality. Passionate Worship. Intentional Faith Development. Risk-Taking Mission and Service. Extravagant Generosity. People are searching for a church shaped and sustained by these qualities. The presence and strength of these five practices demonstrate congregational health, vitality and fruitfulness. By repeating and improving these practices, churches fulfill their mission to make disciples of Jesus Christ for the transformation of the world.

Our hope is that this study will shape the ways we approach, think and practice our areas of ministry and personal discipleship; to deepen, amend, use and extend them into our community so that we are better able to live out the Great Commandment and Great Commission: To love God and to love others and to share the Good News. Pastor Linda's Ponderings

At our General Assembly Dr. Rev. Fred Craddock read from the following passage:

"He called the twelve and began to send them out two by two, and gave them authority over the unclean spirits. He ordered them to take nothing for their journey except a staff; no bread, no bag, no money in their belts; but to wear sandals and not to put on two tunics. He said to them, 'Wherever you enter a house, stay there until you leave the place. If any place will not welcome you and they refuse to hear you, as you leave, shake off the dust that is on your feet as a testimony against them.' So they went out and proclaimed that all should repent. They cast out many demons, and anointed with oil many who were sick and cured them." Mark 6:7-13.

Our theme for the General Assembly was "Tell it!" Dr. Craddock was encouraging us to follow the example of Jesus—to go out into the world and share the good news of how Jesus Christ has changed our lives, how God is still at work in the world, and how God is inviting us all to participate in this Good News. We saw amazing videos and heard fascinating stories of how God is at work in the lives of numerous DOC congregations throughout our world. These congregations are reaching out to those who are lost and alone in exciting and incredible ways—how they reach out is a different story for each, but the plot is the same. They pool together their resources and their gifts in order to reach out to the people in their communities. Coincidentally one of those videos was about a church who through their pastor's sabbatical worked together to discover new ways to bring life into their worship. While the pastor was absent, these folks had to work together in order to continue God's work. Once their pastor returned they worked even harder together to implement their vision and learn how to invite the people from their community into their church. They did so in ways that brought life to them all.

This video reaffirmed what I have already experienced in other congregations—that a time of Sabbatical not only renews and revitalizes the pastor, but it does the same for the congregation as well. I have been so impressed with the amazing ways that people have worked together and the ways in which people have

taken a risk and have ventured into experiences they have not had before—some of them have stood in front of the congregation for the first time and shared their stories and how God has been at work in their lives.

"But the fruit of the Spirit is love, joy, peace, patience, kindness, goodness, faithfulness, gentleness and self-control...." Galatians 5:22.

This month we will begin our study of Five Practices of Fruitful Congregations. Please note, I am encouraging all our youth to participate in the readings and study as well as our adults. In September when we start youth group again, we will also be examining these five practices and learning how to apply them to our lives.

Max Lucado in his book *When God Whispers Your Name* shares his thoughts about the fruit of the Spirit. Lucado advocates that we must choose to live out the fruit of the Spirit—therefore, Lucado suggests that we commit to choose **love** rather than hate, and each day we choose to love God and what God loves. We commit to choose **joy** rather than succumb to the temptation to be cynical. We view each problem as an opportunity to see God. We commit to choose **peace** rather than violence, we live as forgiven people. We commit to choose **patience** rather than cursing the one who takes our place, and rather than complaining the wait is too long, we take that moment in time to pray and thank God. We commit to choose **kindness** and be kind to the rich, the poor and the unkind, for that is how God has treated us. We commit to choose **faithfulness**; we keep promises made and act in ways that do not make others doubt our sincerity. We commit to choose **gentleness** because nothing is won by force. We will raise our voice only to praise God and will raise our hands only to pray. We commit to choose **self-control**; we will be impassioned only by our faith, and we will be influenced only by God. Lucado then ends with this thought, "Love, joy, peace, patience, kindness, goodness, faithfulness, gentleness, and self-control. To these I commit my day. If I succeed, I will give thanks. If I fail, I will seek His grace. And then when this day is done, I will place my head on my pillow and rest."

Getting Recharged!

There is a little book I turn to every now and then when I want to recharge my spiritual batteries... The book was written in 1915 by Harry Emerson Fosdick and is titled, The Meaning of Prayer. Fosdick writes:

Prayer is the soul of religion, and failure there is not a superficial lack for the supply of which the spiritual life leisurely can wait. Failure in prayer is the loss of religion itself in its inward and dynamic aspect of fellowship with the Eternal. Only a theoretical deity is left to any [person] who has ceased to commune with God, and a theoretical deity saves no [person] from sin and disheartenment and fills no life with a sense of divine commission.

I am so glad the Christian Church (Disciples of Christ) is a praying church and that our religion is vital and dynamic in spite of the sea of change in which we are living. I am also glad that the God we worship is not some figment of myths and legends long abandoned, but a God who is closer to us than we are to our very selves and a very present help in times of trouble.

Over the years I have come to identify with that statement from the Bible that says we are to “pray without ceasing” [1 Thessalonians 5:17]. Our lives are to be so prayerful that there is not a moment when we are prayer-less. With every breath a prayer, with every thought a prayer, with every action a prayer! This is living prayer and juxtaposed to dead prayer that is a meaningless babble of words confined to certain times and places and of no sure effect.

Many among us in the church have unwittingly narrowed the field of prayer to Sunday morning prayers, before and after meeting prayers, meal and bedtime prayers. Such might not be a bad place to start, but it cannot be the place God would have us end up. If you limit your prayer life to Sunday mornings, before and after meetings, meals and bedtime there are still over 2,000 minutes in each and every day that have been bereft of prayer.

If you want to keep your religion vital and your relationship with God one that is personal, there is no substitute for prayer... one author has stated:

No problem that can't be solved. No sickness that can't be healed. No burden that can't be lifted. No sinner that can't be saved. No fallen that can't be lifted. No perishing that can't be rescued. No hurt that can't be restored. No nation that can't be transfigured. No hindrance that can't be shaken. No storm that can't be weathered.

A Message From a Messy Elder!

Is your life messy? Do you have doubts? Do you feel less than perfect and somewhat empty? If your answer is “yes” to any or all of these questions, then the verdict is in. Yes, it’s certain that you are right where God wants you!

Okay, you may think that I have just lost my marbles! Maybe I have, but I’ve been reading some books that are telling me that doubts, messiness, and some level of feeling empty are all quite normal and are perfect examples of why we need the Father, the Son and the Holy Spirit. You see, spiritual growth and Christianity don’t come in a neat little package, they’re not perfect, and sometimes they’re not pretty. So let’s explore this a little bit.

If our lives were nice and neat, we wouldn’t need God and the teachings of Jesus. If we were perfect, God wouldn’t have much to help us with! Our spiritual growth and Christianity are a part of the ups and downs of life on a road with many turns and obstacles. Our experiences bring us closer to God. We learn from our doubts and challenges by experiencing eternal grace and forgiveness every step of the way. Every time you lend a hand or listen to someone in need of a friendly ear, you are growing closer to God, and your spiritual meter clicks upward. Giving a hug, holding a hand, and telling someone that you love them, are all opportunities to be an active disciple, because in these simple actions you are declaring that God is real and Jesus is with us.

Yes, it’s okay to have doubts. Even some of the twelve disciples doubted. For instance, Thomas had doubts and Jesus came to help him to grow in spirit and in faith. Although Thomas was broken in this manner, he still became famous for his discipleship and love of Jesus. The Apostle Paul had a pretty messy life and he had a lot of doubt and emptiness as he committed crime after crime against early Christians before his conversion. Yet he was later chosen by God

to be a major leader in the movement for the early church and he authored many of the books in the New Testament.

So know that your doubts, your feelings of emptiness, and the messiness of your life are normal. They don’t make you less of a Christian or cause you to have a low rating on some scale of spirituality. Know that God is with you and wants you to continue to seek the way, the truth and the light. Take time to talk with God through prayer. Take time to listen for God through quiet meditation. Take time to serve God by finding small ways to care for and help others. Allow your messiness to help you find God, right where you are in your life journey.
