

Striving for Peace

Blessed are the peacemakers, for they shall be called the children of God. Matthew 5: 9

Kingston, Jamaica, was the host city for the World Council of Churches' (WCC) International Ecumenical Peace Convocation in May. The theme was "Glory to God and Peace on Earth." It was the culmination of the WCC's Decade to Overcome Violence, which has sought to network and bring attention to the peacemaking initiatives of its various member churches. More than 2,000 participated.

The convocation leaders took time to recognize the work done during the decade to overcome violence, and also invited churches to "renew their commitment to nonviolence, peace and just peace," through a variety of events including the planting of peace trees, a peace Sunday and a peace concert in Kingston.

Churches around the world joined convocation participants in prayers, special events and worship services including the use of a Caribbean prayer for peace, which was translated into more than 20 languages, and singing the convocation theme song, "Glory to God, Peace on Earth," written by Jamaican musician Grub Cooper.

A series of consultations on a variety of peace and reconciliation-related topics took place in the years prior to the convocation, which built significant momentum. One group travelled to the United States last fall to dialogue about gun violence. Another group met with Kenyans struggling with post-election violence. The Rev. Dr. Jayasiri Peiris, general secretary of the National Christian Council of Sri Lanka said the consultation visits represented the church striving "to be the living body of Christ."

The International Ecumenical Peace Convocation participants heard many stories of transformative peace efforts, but also honestly studied where differences and suffering still exist. The convocation became a milestone in ecumenical deliberations on peace and justice.

Today we pray that each one of us will be peacemakers in our world.

I write to you from St. Louis, where I am visiting Union Avenue Christian Church and the programs with whom they work. I have served in a soup kitchen, been in a teen shelter, and visited with Kayla Highley, whom many of you know. I was also able to spend some time in Kansas City visiting with a couple of churches there. My hope in visiting these congregations is to bring some fresh ideas back to our congregation.

Know that I will be praying for you as well. I pray for our ongoing ministry. I pray for the sabbatical team, Pastor Linda, and other leaders in the church. I pray for those in the church family, those who visit, and those who are touched by our ministries. I pray for a renewed sense of feeling God’s spirit for each of you.

Take some time to pray, dream, question, and seek God’s vision.

I look forward to seeing you in September.

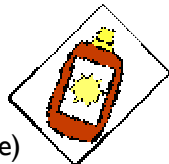

Pastor Linda's Ponderings

“Heaven and Earth were finished, down to the last detail. By the seventh day God had finished his work. On the seventh day he ceased from all his work. God blessed the seventh day. He made it a Holy Day because on that day he ceased from his work, all the creating God had done. This is the story of how it all started, of Heaven and Earth when they were created.” Genesis 2:1-4

It all started in the beginning, God from the very beginning created a Sabbath day, a day where we could have the opportunity to cease from our daily activities and intentionally seek God. The word Sabbath means to cease. That is why we have worship each Sunday. Sunday is our day to cease our regular activities and to spend time with others in worship of our Creator. Throughout the Bible you see this idea of Sabbath over and over again. The book of Exodus is about Sabbath, each time Moses approaches Pharaoh he says to him this basic premise, ‘Let my people go so that they may worship God,’ Exodus 4:23, 5:1, 7:16. God liberates the people from oppression so that they will be free to worship God. As we move through the Bible we discover a funny thing that happens along the way. The people have made so many laws about the Sabbath, the day of worship, that now it has turned into a system of regulations to follow rather than a way of life.

Jesus is criticized for healing a person on the Sabbath and Jesus tells the people – “The Sabbath was made for humankind, not humankind for the Sabbath...” Mark 2:27. Jesus is pointing the people back to the beginning to remind them that God intends for us to set aside time to intentionally seek God out! This is a way of life for us to follow, it is meant to be an act that brings about health, wholeness and renewal! Sometimes we are like the Pharisees asking, “What does the Sabbath prevent?” But rather we should ask, “What does Sabbath allow?” The answer to that question is: Sabbath allows us rest, renewal and delight. We are able to reconnect to God and to others, we are able to build relationships with one another. We need more Sabbath keeping in order to learn more thoroughly who God is and the kind of character God wants to develop in us. Without Sabbath we are back in Egypt; we are slaves to our work. Sabbath can return us to the place where we can be addressed—it’s a recovery of our souls.

Youth News for June

By the time you read this, many of our youth and a few adults have had the opportunity to experience camp and are now preparing for the mission trips this summer! One of the things I love about camp is all the songs that we sing, both silly and spiritual.

One of my favorites is “In the Secret, in the Quiet Place.”

The words of the chorus are:

“I want to know you, I want to hear your voice,
I want to know you more, I want to touch you,
I want to see your face, I want to know you more.”

The reason I love this song is because it conveys what my heart longs for, and it's not so much that I want to gain knowledge about God as much as I want to experience God. We experience God through nature as we are at camp, we experience God through music and song as notes come together in harmony, and we experience God through words - words that sometimes only our heart can understand their meaning. My prayer is that through our time at camp and mission trip you will experience God, that you will hear his voice speak to you, and that you will see his face as you interact with and experience others!

Sharing & good deeds result in vibrant, healthy life—in our personal lives and in our church!

Last month, I discussed a series called “Extravagant Generosity” by Michael Reeves & Jennifer Tyler. This series takes a different approach to the understanding of stewardship and encourages us to think about being generous, not just generous, but having extravagant generosity. In some of their materials, they state that giving helps us become what God wants us to be! God uses our generosity to reconfigure our interior lives, to create us anew, and to foster in us “the mind that was in Christ Jesus.” We, as a congregation, have a responsibility to think deeply, prepare thoroughly, act wisely, and teach courageously about the relationship between faith and money. How does our giving affect our relationship to God? How does our relationship to God affect our giving? How does being a follower of Jesus shape all our behaviors concerning money- how it is earned, spent, saved, and offered to God? These are questions that I would encourage each of you to reflect on during a time of prayer. Seek the Lord's guidance in how you are being called to distribute His assets through you – both in terms of money and time. The church will engage in a series of studies later this year to reflect on these and other important questions and I would encourage you to consider participating in these studies.



Sabbatical FAQs

Here are some frequently asked questions regarding Pastor Tim's Sabbatical. In order to improve the communication between the congregation and the Sabbatical team, we would like to share them with you.

Q: What exactly is a sabbatical leave?

A: A sabbatical is a specific period of time granted to a minister for concentrated focus on professional and spiritual renewal and calling. It is a gift the congregation chose to give to the pastor(s) in recognition of faithful ministry over an extended period of time.

Q: Are sabbatical leaves of absence a "new thing" church pastors are doing these days?

A: No. Traditionally, a pastoral sabbatical leave of absence is taken after every 5-7 years of serving in the ministry of a church. The concept of sabbatical is deeply and unquestionably rooted in Scripture. The term is derived from the Old Testament idea of "rest." *Sabbath* is the Hebrew word for rest. God created the world in six days and rested on the seventh (Genesis 2:1-3).

Q: Is Pastor Tim earning a salary while he is on sabbatical leave?

A: Yes. While a pastor is on sabbatical leave, he or she will earn their full salary and benefits, plus expenses. As it is written into Pastor Tim's contract, he is to take a sabbatical leave every five years. All details of Pastor Tim's sabbatical are found, and can be reviewed by any church member in either, Tim's contract, the church by-laws, yearly budget, or in the employee handbook.

Q: Is it true Pastor Tim asked the church to pay his expenses?

A: No. The Church Board has known for some time that Pastor Tim was to take a Sabbatical leave. Sabbatical expenses were never budgeted for until this year. The next planned Sabbatical leave Pastor Tim takes will be budgeted for in every year's proposed budget.

Q: Is Pastor Tim's sabbatical just a vacation?

A: No. Pastor Tim's sabbatical is not a vacation or personal leave. Rather it is a time for creative and intentional meditation, reflection, study and "going deeper with God."

Q: What does the church receive in return?

A: An important result of a sabbatical leave is spiritual renewal for the pastor. He returns to the church congregation with renewed focus and energy to fulfill God's calling.

Q: Is Pastor Tim going to look for other employment opportunities while he is away?

A: No. As promised by both Pastor Tim and the church congregation in the Sabbatical Covenant, neither the church, nor Pastor Tim, can make a change in employment status for at least a year after his return.

Q: Is it really that critical that our pastor(s) take a sabbatical leave?

A: Yes. The increasing pressures and demands of ministry today prove to put immense responsibilities on church pastors and it can take a huge toll on their ministry. When pastors run out of steam, they generally do one of the following things: they move to another church; they find another occupation; they get sick; or they even shutdown. The time for a Sabbatical is not when the church board realizes their pastor needs one, it's before! A Sabbatical is simply a strategically calculated and planned respite from one's normal duties to rest, rejuvenate one's health and vitality, in order to regain spiritual perspective and renew passion. The scriptures tell us of how Jesus reflected upon his' own ministry and appreciation for the demands of ministry. The demands upon Him were so great that his own ministry was disrupted with times of removal for prayer and spiritual seclusion (Matthew 14:23; Luke 5:16).

- We as one community will be respectful of our lay leadership, which includes being welcoming and supportive of our guest speakers.
- We as one community acknowledge that not everything may go as we had expected during Pastor Tim’s Sabbatical; and we will do our best to see this as an opportunity of growth for our church family.
