Many groups travel from the US to another part of the world on a mission trip. Some of these groups plan their trips with Global Ministries' People to People Pilgrimages office in order to maximize their spiritual experience as well. One group from Atlanta, GA, recently traveled to India. One pilgrim wrote:

One month ago today we were ringing in the New Year sitting halfway around the world in the Christian Church of Mungeli, India. Even though the words spoken were unrecognizable Hindi, there were some comfortably familiar sights as I gazed around the sanctuary: wooden pews filled with worshippers, Bibles and hymnals in their hands; the open communion table; a temperamental sound system that worked intermittently, and the cadence of the Lord's Prayer—recognizable even when spoken in a language foreign to my ears. My eyes came to rest upon the wooden cross on the table and I reflected on how this symbol of Christianity had taken on a new meaning for me recently. In learning of the concepts of vertical and horizontal faith, I have come to look at the cross as a symbolic representation of these two dimensions of faith.

VERTICAL faith is about one's relationship with God; an awareness of God's teachings and his presence in your life.

HORIZONTAL faith is about sharing those vertical discoveries; serving outside our comfort zone; reaching out and touching others with God's love.

TRUE faith needs both components: our love and action (the horizontal piece) is grounded in the love we receive from God (which we discover through the vertical piece). Without the horizontal piece, there is a disconnect between faith and life.

For me, the cross has become a beautiful, visual depiction of vertical and horizontal faith.

Missionary Anil Henry shared this story of an individual with a mission group. He works with the Synodical Board of Health Services of the Church of North India. He serves as Acting Director at Christian Hospital, Mungeli along with his wife, Teresa, as Senior Medical Officer.

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A MOMENT WITH TIM

Jesus, full of the Holy Spirit, returned from the Jordan and was led by the Spirit in the wilderness, where for forty days he was tempted by the devil. Luke 4: 1-2a

The Season of Lent started on February 17th with our Ash Wednesday service, and it will continue throughout the month of March. As part of the Christian Church (Disciples of Christ), our congregation has the freedom to completely ignore the time of Lent or to embrace it as an important aspect of our faith life. If you visit different Disciple churches, you will find both of those extremes and many places in between.

Why do you find such difference? Part of the reason is that the Disciple Church has much more of a congregational style than a hierarchical style. Each congregation has the freedom to choose which traditions to embrace rather than having a Bishop who decides for all the congregations. Part of the reason is that Disciples have a continuing tradition of unity and conversation with other churches. In those conversations and relationships we can begin to see value in different church traditions. Perhaps part of the reason is that over the past 25 years many Disciples seminaries have embraced and taught an understanding of a liturgical year which includes Advent and Lent.

In a congregation like ours, this means that to some Lent has significant meaning, while others think it is the stuff you pull out of the trap in your washing machine. Both fester and I come out of an educational and church background that places value on the liturgical year including the season of Lent. Our question over the last few years, which may be different from many Disciple ministers of generations past, has not been, "How do we distinguish ourselves from the Catholics or Lutherans (or whoever)?" It has been, "What do other traditions have to offer that might help us to be more faithful?" We have both found value in the Season of Lent, so we have included it in Worship and Christian Education conversations.

Whether you have found great value in Lent or whether you are suspicious of it, I invite you to explore some of its engaging aspects. In this 40-day period (plus Sundays) prior to Easter, take time to devote yourself to prayer and reflection each day. Take time for repentance and renewal. Think about giving something up or adding a beneficial practice. Although the time of Lent has already started, you can still reap many benefits by preparing for the celebration of the resurrection on Easter Sunday.

Elder's Message

"Therefore, as God's chosen people, holy and dearly loved, clothe yourselves with compassion, kindness, humility, gentleness and patience. Bear with each other and forgive whatever grievances you may have against one another. Forgive as the Lord forgave you." Colossians 3:12-13

I was recently reading a devotional from InspiredFaith.com that focused on this scripture. As we are in the Lenten season and are preparing for Holy Week, it seemed to be a timely lesson: God created and blessed every living creature with the ability to protect itself. Let's look at what happens when a tiny grain of sand gets inside an oyster's shell. This tiny particle can be life-threatening to the oyster because it has such a soft and delicate tissue. Most living things protect themselves by eliminating the threat, but the oyster does not try to force the sand out of its shell. Instead, it emits a compound to encircle the intruder and eventually it becomes a smooth, hard, beautiful pearl.

What would happen if we were to be more like an oyster and rather than discarding a malcontented or unlovable person from our lives, we welcomed them and embraced them with the love of God? Can we see these people as opportunities for sharing and experiencing God's love? Would it create something beautiful inside of us, just as the oyster created the pearl?

Jesus did just that very thing many times in his short life on Earth. He gave everyone an opportunity to know him and his Holy Father regardless of individual circumstances. Jesus did not shun those who were poor or had committed crimes—instead he showed them love, care and concern. His love enveloped them like the hard, beautiful shell of a pearl.

As we continue through this time of Lent and prepare for Easter, ask God how you can become more like an oyster, enveloping rather than eliminating the dangers in our lives.



Campus Ministry Moment:

a periodic update on our ecumenically-supported ministry at UNC
United Methodist Church – Presbyterian Church (USA)
Christian Church (Disciples of Christ) – United Church of Christ

Hello, my name is Jamie Kepros and I am the new minister for Christian Campus Ministry at UNC. I am a recent graduate of the Iliff School of Theology and a candidate for ordination in the United Church of Christ. As I begin this ministry, I look forward to working with our ecumenical partners—you! I imagine that some readers of this update are more familiar with our ministry at UNC than others. So first, for those who might not know, a very brief introduction of who we are.

Christian Campus Ministry (CCM) has a long history as an ecumenical, mainline presence at UNC. The four denominations listed above have partnered to sponsor this ministry for over forty years. With the support of our regional bodies, local churches and individuals, CCM offers an array of programs and activities for students on and off campus.

CCM consists of a quarter-time paid minister and a volunteer advisory board. The advisory board is comprised of representatives from our local churches. Currently, we rent meeting space at the Lutheran Campus Center house on 11th Avenue.

Already I am inspired, challenged, and deepened by this ministry. I hope that you might share with me the inspirations and challenges, if only in just a small way. Were you involved in a campus ministry in college? What sort of theological questions were you asking during those formative years? What can mainline campus ministry look like as we begin a new decade in the 21st century?

I will leave you with just a few of the sentiments I have heard so far from our students:

"How can we get over our divisions as Christians and love one another better?"

"I'm waiting for people to start to talk about 'community' because 'community' speaks to how we are all interconnected. Things will change when that word enters the dialogue."

"I pray for the people of Haiti, that they may know God's love and presence in the middle of great suffering."

Thank you for your support of the inspiring and challenging minds and hearts that make up CCM.
