Living and Learning in a Troubled World

Uskudar American Academy in Uskudar, Turkey, is an historic mission school founded by missionaries in 1873 during the Ottoman Empire. Today it is a secular, private school that strives to prepare students for a rapidly changing multicultural, multilingual, and religiously diverse world. Academic Dean Alison Stendahl reflects: "Any school is a subset of its surrounding world, where its diverse community members learn to understand one another even in the face of conflict and disagreement. When a community truly and sincerely cares for its members, it can be a nurturing place where one should feel safe. Turkey borders a region caught up in strong social and political forces. The more the region destabilizes, the greater the effects on Turkey as it braces itself for an influx of refugees. We are particularly aware of how immense social pressure can eventually focus people on their differences rather than their commonalities. We focus on those who strive to build bridges of understanding rather than to construct walls of fear.

The academy has one of the most respected Model United Nations conferences where 500 high school students from various countries come together in a forum to seriously examine the major issues facing this geographic region. Dedicated to preparing students for an increasingly intertwined and complex world, it has a strong vision for the future and is also a supportive and caring community. Though the vast number of teachers and students are Muslim, several are also from Christian and Jewish backgrounds. Together this diverse community models how a common vision can give its members energy to strive for a better and more positive future.

We pray for students, who through social service projects do what they can to help those who have needs beyond their imagining. We pray for teachers who work with the youth, as they explore what it truly means to be a global citizen in today's world.

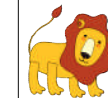

## Pastor Linda's Ponderings

**"It requires an enormous human effort to be and to stay in the world with its many demands while keeping our hearts and minds solidly in God."** Henri Nouwen, *Following the Movements of the Spirit—Spiritual Formation*.

As I have spent time pondering what it means to practice passionate worship and intentional faith development, I have realized that what Nouwen says is true. In fact Nouwen goes on to say that, as we practice various types of disciplines, they should provide us freedom as well as boundaries. We need boundaries in order to make space for God. Otherwise, Nouwen says, our lives become narrow, we see and hear less, and we become one-dimensional people.

It seems like everything and everyone around us wants us to fill up every bit of space in our lives so we become occupied—as well as preoccupied—people. When we allow this to happen, it becomes difficult to focus on God—to make space for God. I share this with you for two reasons. First, I am asking you to begin to examine your own life and to pay attention to times when you feel you have no space for God; then begin to make that space for God by setting boundaries. It's okay to say "no" so that you can make space for God.

The second reason I bring this up is on behalf of Pastor Tim and myself. It takes a lot of prayer, energy, thought and time to enter into and lead worship. It requires making space for God, which means setting boundaries. So, what we would like to share with you all is this—we desire to bring our very best to worship each and every week. In order to do that we would like to ask that you use our office hours during the week to conduct church business. If you have an emergency or question concerning worship that morning—or a prayer request—then please share those concerns and questions with us, otherwise we ask that you wait until Monday.

I realize that in sharing this with you all it may bring up questions or concerns; some of you may be wondering, "What if I think about what I need

to ask you right then?" Maybe some of you are feeling like the only opportunity to speak with us is on Sunday mornings, or maybe some of you feel disappointed that we have asked you to wait. ## Wednesday Night Fellowship Begins October 5th

By popular demand and in keeping with our challenges of Radical Hospitality and Intentional Faith Development, Wednesday Night Fellowship is back. We will begin on Wednesday, October 5<sup>th</sup>, at 6:00 p.m. and meet for six weeks. Dinner is from 6:00 p.m. until 6:30 p.m., and we ask you to bring something associated with the weekly theme (Mexican Night, Italian Night, etc.).

From 6:30-7:30 we will provide five small group options:

Pastor Linda will be leading a small group for those who would like to discuss and participate in **Spiritual Formation**. This small group study will be based on the book Following the Movements of the Spirit—Spiritual Formation by Henri Nouwen. Nouwen says, "Spiritual Formation is not about steps or stages on the way to perfection. It's about the movements from the mind to the heart through prayer in its many forms that reunite us with God, each other, and our truest selves." This is an opportunity to intentionally seek God in the midst of our busy lives. This is an inter-generational group for those 5th grade and up. ## Elder's Message

The Elders have been studying the book "Messy Spirituality" by Michael Yaconelli. In one of the chapters of that book it was stated that, in this present day in many areas, Christians are considered rather odd. I grew up on a farm in Thayer County, Nebraska, near the county seat town of Hebron. First Christian Church, Disciples of Christ, was the first church to be established in that county in 1869. In that town of less than 2,000 population, there were also four other churches: Methodist, Presbyterian, Lutheran, and Catholic. There were ten other smaller towns in the county—each with two or three churches. At least three of those other towns also had a Disciples church. There were also a few country churches in the county. In that area you were more likely to be considered odd if you were not a Christian.

In my hungrier days in business with three kids in college, there were hardly enough hours in the day to work to make ends meet. If I could have gotten a sales appointment on a holiday, I would have probably taken it. I remember making an evening appointment one time on Maundy Thursday with a nice Lutheran couple in Nebraska who were clients. When I got there he mentioned that if it had not been for my appointment that evening, they would have been in church. I apologized for the oversight and told him that we had become rather lax in church attendance. I went on to say that in earlier times, the church in most areas seemed to be the social center of the community, but now there were many other activities competing for everyone's time.

In the course of visiting with them, we were talking about how times had changed from the days of leaving the house unlocked and leaving the keys in the car, and how you certainly couldn't trust people like that anymore. I said that I didn't know just when that all started to change. His reply was, "Probably about the time that the church quit being the social center of the community."

Perhaps our churches today need to be more visible in the community.

## Capital Improvement Update

This spring the congregation approved Phase I (Evaluation of Need) of the investigation to improve our facilities and to move on to Phase II—Design and Scoping. The Capital Improvement Committee has now met with three architects and has issued a formal request for a proposal to get bids on conceptual designs for the improvements.

The bids should be in around the first part of October, and we hope to finalize negotiations with a firm during the first part of December. We hope the architectural design work can be completed by the end of February, and the committee will be able to solicit feedback from the congregation and provide an overall recommendation for Phase II within a few months after.

At the end of Phase II, the congregation will understand the scope of the project(s) that we want to undertake along with having a preliminary financing plan. A congregational vote will take place to approve the Phase II plans and commit to moving to Phase III, which would be to select a contractor(s), complete architectural designs, and kick off the financing of the project. I would like to thank the others on the committee for their hard work in getting us to where we are—Carla Ikenouye, Bill Kehl, Jodi Hartmann, Jim Prichard, and Tim Bobbitt. Please feel free to contact any of us if you have any questions.
