A MESSAGE FROM VINCE

As our church experiences this time of transition between saying good-bye to former ministers and welcoming a new minister, it occurs to me that Christianity has always existed at a juncture of the past and the future. We are a religion that looks back on and celebrates the past (the creation of the world; the calling of God's people; the words of the prophets; the life, death and resurrection of Christ) while simultaneously looking forward to and hoping for a future of restoration, redemption and resurrection. We celebrate the lives of loved ones who have passed on, while at the same time looking forward to reuniting with them in the future. We honor traditions of past Christians while concurrently looking for new and relevant ways to make those traditions meaningful to a new generation. With a mystical irony, we celebrate the last meal Jesus ate with his disciples, a ritual specifically established to look forward to the future: "I tell you, I will not drink from this fruit of the vine again until that day when I drink it new with you in my Father's kingdom" (Matthew 26:29). Like the focal point of the cross, Christianity exists in the here and now between the horizontal beam of those things that have happened and the vertical beam of those things that will happen. The inherent danger is that we do not dwell in the past nor consume ourselves with the future. Instead, we must always live our lives in the present, letting the shadow of the cross illuminate our journey forward.
