




Pastor Vince's Ash Wednesday Message

Our service tonight is that much like a funeral. Because Ash Wednesday is an honoring, a remembrance, and even a celebration of death and suffering. We remember the time of suffering of Jesus in the desert before he started his ministry. We place ashes on our own foreheads as we hear the words, "you are dust, and to dust you shall return." The ashes are placed in the shape of a cross – symbolizing the death of Christ. We even use ashes made from the burnt celebration branches used only a year before to welcome Jesus into Jerusalem on Palm Sunday. Our body that we have laid on the table, is the body of our celebration - of our lifted spirits.

Why a celebration for suffering and death? Christianity has a unique perspective of suffering and death. We even worship a God that suffers and a God that has experienced death. Early theologians, in trying to make sense of why Jesus had to suffer, realized that a God who did not experience suffering, pain, and loss was a God who did not understand the human condition. Our God chose to experience humanity in order to save humanity. The word Christ or Messiah in biblical history is the name for one who is anointed by God to liberate. It is interesting that, in order to liberate us from the sting of pain and death, our Messiah experienced those things. Because he knew that to be one with us, he needed to feel what we feel.

Lent is a time when Christians abstain from pleasure or take on things to purposely make themselves feel burdened. Sometimes it is as simple as abstaining from eating sweets, sometimes it is adding some sort of community service, sometimes it is just stepping out of our comfort zones to do something for others. Whether it be a big change in life, or a small change that might feel like a big change, it is not because we are masochists, or feel we somehow deserve pain, it is to, as Christ our master, relate to others. To feel the pain of all. To, even in some little way, identify with the one who has lost, who feels alone, who is in the dark. To identify with the poor, with the malnourished, with the hungry. With the abused.

Our service tonight is much like a funeral – it is a funeral for ourselves. To remember that death is the great equalizer. It comes to all. No person is above another, and no person out of its grasp. Even God has subjected God's self to death. And if you are looking for a message of comfort, there is one. In time, we will celebrate the resurrection, but that is later; that is not the comfort of lent. The comfort of lent is a comfort that we find in unity. A comfort found in solidarity with one another and with God: That our God created us to be one and is one with us.

Let us unite with each other and with God - "you are dust, and to dust you shall return."

Elder's Message

If everything we have in the history of God's dealing with his creation had a connecting line to one image, ultimately that image would be the cross. From the fall on the Garden of Eden to the teachings of the early church and the prophecies of the Eternal Kingdom, the cross stands eternal.

There are many designs of crosses, but the most familiar to us is the "Roman Cross." It is an upright stake with a vertical cross-piece below the top. This is the kind of cross Christ was crucified on, we believe, and it is the symbol of Christianity. This cross is visible everywhere, on roadside memorials and of course on churches; in fact, we have ten crosses on the outside of our church. The cross that appears on our chalice emblem is the "St. Andrew Cross." It is there as a reminder of the ministry of each person and the importance of evangelism. It recalls the denomination's Scottish Presbyterian ancestry.

There is a concept in the New Testament that the word "cross" is either symbolic of self-sacrifice or a thing of shame because crucifixion was considered a shameful death. However, in the gospels, before his crucifixion, Jesus spoke of the necessity of those who would follow him of taking up the cross. Luke 14:27 says, "whoever does not bear his own cross and come after me, cannot be my disciple." In Paul's writings, he uses the "Cross as the great instrument of reconciliation between God and man, between Gentile and Jew."

You don't have to look for your cross; life gives it to you. A real cross is one you don't want because otherwise it is hardly a cross. We are invited by God, as Jesus was, to accept our crosses. Suffering is part of the human reality. Acceptance is what Jesus invites us to on the cross. Like Jesus, you can allow others to help you carry your cross, but it should never become someone else's cross. In every cross there is an invitation to new life in some way. The cross is often where we meet God because our vulnerability can make us open to God's grace.

The cross is God's new rainbow shining brightly in a storm-tossed, fearful and turbulent world. As the rainbow is a symbol of God's promise of safety from destruction by another flood, the cross is his promise of safety from the ferocious storms of life: a symbol of atonement, forgiveness, and love.

Colorado's Low-income Energy Assistance Program (LEAP) helps Colorado families, individuals, older adults, and those with a disability pay their winter home heating costs. **LEAP applications are accepted from November 1-April 30 only.**

Earned Income Tax Credit

The federal Earned Income Tax Credit gives money back to people who earn lower incomes. Even if you earn little to no income, be sure to file your taxes. You could be eligible to receive from \$560 to \$6,935 based on your income, filing status, and number of dependent children.

File Your Taxes for Free

File your taxes online or on your smartphone for free if your 2023 income was less than \$79,000. In addition, free in-person help is available for people who generally made \$64,000 or less, people with disabilities, and limited English-speaking taxpayers.

FCC's Food Pantry
